Aide Memoire of the Inception Mission 13 to 22 February 2023, 10 May 2023

I. INTRODUCTION

- The Asian Development Bank undertook a loan and grant inception mission (the Mission¹) from 13 to 22 February 2023 for the Flood and Riverbank Erosion Risk Management Investment Program - Tranche 2 project (Project 2) to (i) discuss the project administration manual, procurement of goods, works, consulting services, project staffing, financial management aspects, loan and grant covenants, gender aspects, social and environmental safeguards, reporting requirements, contract award and disbursement to date and for the remainder of the year, and ADB project performance rating system; (ii) review progress of activities, procurement of goods, works, and consulting services, as well as the status of the financial management action plan, of the road map of the investment program, and of the design and monitoring framework (DMF) of Project 2; (iii) discuss the government budget allocation for this fiscal year and the next one to ensure that sufficient counterpart funds have been provisioned by the government; (iv) ensure that the Project Management Office (PMO) understands the procedures for submitting withdrawal applications; (v) discuss actions to get the project performance rating back on track; (vi) agree an action plan for the next six months; (vii) discuss progress and issues with the Embassy of the Kingdom of the Netherlands (EKN); and (viii) delegate the project administration to Bangladesh Resident Mission (BRM).
- 2. The kick-off meeting was held on 13 February 2023. The Mission had extensive discussions with the PMO and members of the institutional strengthening and project management consultant (ISPMC) team. The Mission also had a meeting with the First Secretary Water Management and Food Security and the Senior Policy Advisor, Integrated Water Resources Management of EKN, and with DG, BWDB. A wrap up meeting with the Ministry of Water Resources (MoWR) took place on 22 February 2023 and was chaired by the Additional Secretary (Development Wing) of MoWR. A wrap up meeting with the Economic Relations Division (ERD) took place on 10 May 2023 and was chaired by the Joint Secretary (ADB Wing) of ERD. The findings of the mission were discussed during both meetings. The list of key persons met during by the mission is in Appendix 1.
- 3. This Aide Memoire summarizes the discussions held and understandings reached during the mission. The content of this Aide Memoire is subject to the approval of the higher authorities of the Government of Bangladesh and ADB. The Mission kindly requests the government to confirm the understandings set out herein by 25 May 2023.

II. BACKGROUND – THE INVESTMENT PROGRAM

- 4. Approved by ADB on 26 June 2014, the Flood and Riverbank Erosion Risk Management Investment Program through a multitranche financing facility (MFF) aims at improving the livelihoods of people in the project area along the Jamuna, Padma, and Ganges rivers in Bangladesh. It will reduce flood and riverbank erosion risks in priority erosion reaches through structural and nonstructural interventions, and institutional and knowledge-based strengthening. It will implement three subprojects comprising climate-resilient flood embankments protecting critical riparian productive areas in central Bangladesh and capacity building initiatives. It will extend successful riverbank protection technologies of the ADB-financed Jamuna-Meghna River Erosion Mitigation Project to other areas, with necessary improvements. The executing agency is the Bangladesh Water Development Board (BWDB) under the Ministry of Water Resources (MOWR). The Department of Disaster Management (DDM) under the Ministry of Disaster Management and Relief is the implementing agency for the community-based flood risk management (CBFRM) activities.
- 5. The program was designed to be implemented over 9 years and financed in three tranches. However, at the government's request, the originally envisaged Tranches 2 and 3 of the MFF have been combined into a single and final tranche (Tranche 2) during the processing of Project 2 in 2021. The MFF availability period has been extended to its maximum of 10 years to complete the remaining activities under the MFF. The MFF and Project 2 will both close on 26 June 2024.
- 6. **Tranche 1 project** (Loan 3138/Grant 0396) was approved on 3 July 2014 for \$80.3 million,² signed on 14 August 2014, and declared effective on 17 September 2014. Tranche 1 was completed on 31 March 2021 and financially closed on 24 October 2021.³ The following activities were completed under Tranche 1: (i) construction of a new 17.8 km riverbank protection works was completed using adaptive approach method; (ii) 21.3 km of flood protection embankment were completed considering 100-year probable flood and climate change issues; (iii) 40 community-based disaster management units operate disaster-resilience action plan against flood and erosion disasters with 100% of units led by women; (iv) four new regulators were installed; and (v) the long-term strategic river stabilization plan study for the Jamuna, Padma and Lower Meghna rivers was approved by BWDB on 24 June 2020.
- 7. **Tranche 2 project** (Loan 4107/Grant 0799) was approved on 6 September 2021 for a loan of \$157 million and a grant of \$17.89 million from the Government of the Netherlands, fully administered by ADB. ADB and the government signed the loan and grant agreements on 1 March 2022 which were declared effective on 18 April 2022. Project 2, along with the MFF, will close on 26 June 2024.
- 8. Key activities under Project 2 include: (i) 30 km of riverbank protection including specifically for the Salimabad river channel closure innovative dredging and bioengineering to provide an offtake into a distributary and enable to reclaim floodplain land and char land,⁴ (ii) 40 km of riverbank protection adaptation works and 6 km of emergency works, (iii) 7.9 km of

climate-resilient flood embankment, (iv) an offtake, (v) two regulators, (vi) establishing 160 community disaster management units and developing their capacity, (vii) training 40 disaster units created under Project 1 to enhance sustainability, (viii) establishing 14 community groups for livelihood training programs, (ix) raising awareness on flood and riverbank erosion risk management, and (x) strengthening disaster preparedness and emergency response with a focus on women's participation. Also, Project 2 continues to strengthen the knowledge base and institutional capacity of BWDB and DDM in sustainable asset and strategic management of the rivers through the following programmed activities: (i) support to the office of the Chief Engineer, River Management, BWDB, including drone surveys for O&M needs; (ii) river surveys; (iii) incorporation of knowledge products such as the river stabilization plan and site data on BWDB's website; and (iv) update of the river stabilization guidelines.

III. MISSION FINDINGS - IMPLEMENTATION STATUS

A. Procurement matters

9. **Overview.** Procurement for the project is to be carried out in accordance with ADB's Procurement Policy (2017, as amended from time to time) and the Procurement Regulations for ADB Borrowers (2017, as amended from time to time). All the works, goods, and consulting services packages are to be procured by PMO, apart from the goods and consulting services package for community-based flood risk management activities which is under DDM's responsibility. At the time of the mission, 11 packages were already awarded, two of which were yet to be recorded in the ADB system; subsequently to the mission, package C-21 was awarded; all 12 packages are now recorded in the ADB system, totaling around \$72.66 million, \$66.62 million of which is ADB financing share. Of the 12 packages, four are goods (G-01, G-02, G-04); five are works (W-01, W-02, W-03, W-04, W-05) and 3 are consulting services packages (C-01, C-05, C-21). Table 1 shows the list of awarded packages.

10. ADB completed the prior review of four goods and 2 works packages. One goods package (G-05) remains to be prior reviewed by ADB, PMO submitted the draft bidding document to ADB on 27 April 2023. All the consulting services packages are under prior review. Three packages (C-01, C-05 and C-21) have been awarded. The Mission has completed the review of eight terms of reference (TOR) in December 2022 and packages have been tendered by the PMO, five TORs (C-02, C-03, C-07, C-10 and C-15) are currently under review with ADB, while TORs and bidding documents (BDs) for four packages (C-04, C-06, C-13 and C-16) are currently being prepared by the PMO. Table 2 shows the review type and status of the packages.



- 11. **Works.** Works comprise of 18 packages to be procured using the e-government web portal (e-GP) method. These are for riverbank protection works (five packages for underwater riverbank protection works, two packages for adaptation works, one package for emergency works, five packages for permanent wave protection works), Salimabad channel closure works and offtake structure (two packages), embankment construction, embankment maintenance, O&M sheds, and fish sanctuaries (each one package). Out of these, the five packages for underwater works have been awarded and works have started on site. Out of the remaining packages, one adaptation works package (for pre-existing works) and the embankment maintenance package have been tendered out. The emergency works package has been tendered out and is under evaluation. The O&M shed construction package is under preparation and expected to be tendered out by end May 2023.
- 12. The initial protection works packages (W01 to W05) include protection of the upper riverbank (above low water level) from wave erosion through placement of geobags on the existing slope. Following completion of the land acquisition process, the upper riverbank would need to be cut and graded to a geotechnically stable slope (through W12 to W15), however this second step is now not possible anymore as the initial protection works is delayed, which in turn induces delays to the land acquisition process for these small strips of land. However, placement of geobags on slopes has proven to be sustainable for a number of years (ie: similar works at sites under Project 1 implemented in 2016 still rely on placed geobags).

13. Work packages related to the Salimabad channel closure works (W-08 and W-17) are no longer technically feasible to implement due to large-scale unforeseen morphological changes that have taken place around this location since the preparation of the project in 2019/2020. Aerial photographs depicting the changes are in Appendix 2. Also, other packages (wave

protection W-12 to W-15, fish sanctuaries W-18) are not possible anymore due to delays in required pre-work activities such as design and land acquisition.⁵

- 14. Goods. Out of the nine goods packages of the procurement plan, four have been awarded, comprising over 80% of the total funds allocated for goods procurement. All the letters of credit (LC) received by ADB have been cleared. Delivery of the goods for four packages (G-01 to G-04) has commenced since 28 February 2023 (G-02), mid-March 2023 (G-03 and G-04), and mid-April 2023 (G-01). Out of the remaining five goods packages, two (G-06 and G-08) are proposed by the PMO to be cancelled during the mid-term review mission. The G-06 package was not approved by the government during the DPP approval process due to the current recent ban of the government on the procurement of vehicles. Similarly, the package G-08 (survey/speed boats) which included purchasing motor engines was initially approved in the DPP but then was rejected by MoWR during their November 2022 review of the funds to be allocated to this project. The remaining goods package for the procurement of geotextile bags (G-05) is required for works to be implemented after the 2023 flood season with targeted delivery on site to start from November 2023 (PMO submitted the draft bidding documents to ADB on 27 April 2023). The two small packages for office equipment for PMO and PMU-DDM (G-07 and G-09) were anticipated by the PMO to be awarded by end of March 2023, however, the sole bidder for G-07 has been evaluated as non-responsive, hence re-tendering is required for this package; for the package G-09, tendering is ongoing.
- 15. Consultancy services. The procurement of consultancy services is carried out by PMO for 23 packages and by DDM PMU for one package. Out of the 24 packages, to date three have been awarded (C-01 for ISPMC, C-05 for river survey, and C-21 Procurement Specialist). Out of the remaining 20 packages under BWDB PMO, 7 packages (C-17 to 20 External monitors and C-22 to 24 for Individual consultants) are to be tendered out by PMO by 15 May 2023, while contract for package C-21 Procurement Specialist was signed on 7 March 2023. Complete set of Submission 2 documents for C-08 was submitted to ADB on 26 March 2023 and ADB no objection was provided on 14 April 2023. C-10 was cancelled due to the substantial changes in the scope of work and will be readvertised, PMO provided the revised TOR and is under ADB review. The PMO has submitted three packages (C-03 for Participatory O&M, C-07 for Environmental management and C-15 for Environmental baseline study) to ADB for review; the review is ongoing and the Mission will complete their review by 11 May 2023. Currently, the PMO is preparing the ToRs and bidding documents for four packages: C-04 for Livelihood development, C-06 for management information system (MIS), C-13 Topographic surveys and C-16 for Socio-economic study of char people. The PMO intends to complete the TORs preparation by 15 May 2023. The PMO proposes to cancel the four remaining packages as they are either no longer required due to the large-scale morphological changes in the vicinity of the Salimabad channel closure area (i.e., C-11 for Numerical model study for Salimabad closure and C-12 for Physical model study for Ghior Khal offtake) or now planned to be undertaken using provisional sums under the ISPMC (i.e., C-14 for Monitoring of pilot works) or are no longer needed for the planning of the remaining wave protection works (C-09 geotechnical surveys).
- 16. **Activities under DDM.** Regarding the CbFRM activities to be implemented by the PMU of DDM, the MoU between BWDB and DDM was signed on 6 February 2023. With ISPMC's

support, DDM has prepared the TOR of the C-02 package, which is currently under review by ADB. The Mission agreed that this package will be restricted to NGOs as indicated in the procurement plan, use the QCBS 80:20 modality, and that the type of proposals will be for simplified technical proposals (STP). PMU has provided ADB with (i) assurance that at least 6 qualified NGOs can apply for this package, and (ii) detailed justification of the changes (i.e., from 90:10 to 80:20 and from FTP to STP). Also, the Mission informed that PMU may apply a modified (simplified) recruitment procedure to reflect the capacity of the competing NGOs where the evaluation criteria reflect the unique qualifications of the NGOs including: (i) history of work with local communities and evidence of satisfactory performance; (ii) familiarity with participatory development approaches; (iii) committed leadership and adequate management; and (iv) capacity to co-opt beneficiary participation. The PMU published an advance contracting notice on 20 March 2023.

- 17. Duration of advertisement for the consulting services packages. The PMO informed the Mission that aside from ADB's Consultant Management System (CMS), they intend to advertise the various packages in local newspapers to conform with GoB regulations. The Mission reminded the PMO that procurement/recruitment under the project needs to follow ADB quidelines. Following ADB quidelines will enable PMO to significantly expedite the recruitment process and keep up with the remaining limited project implementation period. ADB's Procurement Staff Instructions allows posting of minimum 15 days for firm recruitment and minimum 7 days for recruiting individual consultants using solely CMS or similar e-procurement systems in receiving expression of interests (fully electronic submission), whereas ADB requires a 30-day posting period for posting that is not solely electronic, i.e., if a newspaper, gazette, etc. are used (solely or alongside electronic publication). Using solely CMS will allow PMO to significantly speed up the process (even if cases arise of needs to re-advertise). The Mission also mentioned that PMO could advertise for say 10 days, if 7 days may be deemed too short. Due to the limited remaining time left to implement this project, the Mission strongly recommends that PMO and DDM PMU expedite the remaining recruitments and use solely CMS to shorten the advertising duration to have the consultants on board as soon as possible.
- 18. **Post (Sampling) Review.** The Project Administration Manual (PAM) specifies that post (sampling) review will be carried by ADB out after 30% and 70% of contracts are awarded. The Mission advised PMO to promptly inform ADB on achieving the award of 30% and 70% equivalent of total ADB financing amount for ADB to start conducting the post sampling review. Total contract amount awarded to date is around \$ 72.66 million (para. 8, Table 1) representing around 41% of the total ADB and GoN financing of \$174.89 million. ADB may start conducting random post sampling reviews of procurement processes and contract awards at any time. The Mission reminded PMO that if any of the post-review packages is assessed by ADB as non-eligible for ADB financing, ADB may refuse to finance that particular package, which would then have to be financed entirely by the government. For packages under post review (sampling), the Mission informed PMO to provide ADB with a certified summary sheet reporting on the main aspects of the bid evaluation and contract award at the time of each contract award as indicated in the PAM.
- 19. **Procurement Plan.** The procurement plan will be updated by the PMO by 15 May 2023 and submitted to ADB for approval. The detailed package-wise status of procurement is in Appendix 3. The changes agreed include:
 - (i) vehicles including 4 pick-up trucks & 4 Jeep vehicles (G-06): package to be deleted:

- (ii) office equipment for PMO (G-07): package to be renumbered to G-06 following deletion of the vehicles package and rename to PMO Office Equipment;
- (iii) survey equipment (G-08): package to be deleted due to the current recent ban of the government;
- (iv) office equipment for PMU of DDM (G-09): package to be renumbered to G-08 and renamed to PMU-DDM Office Equipment;
- (v) cancellation of all packages associated with the Salimabad channel closure (i.e., two work packages: W-08 and W-17 and two consultancy packages: C-11 and C-12);
- (vi) cancellation of packages dependent on other pre-conditional works (i.e. four work packages: W-12 to W-15 and one consultancy package: C-09) some of these activities may be carried out by BWDB with government funds after completion of the project as the DPP is valid till June 2025;
- (vii) cancellation of work package W-18 that depends on identification and design of works through the delayed C-07 package;
- (viii) package C-14 is no longer required as it is now planned to be undertaken under the ISPMC package;
- (ix) inclusion of DDM as procuring entity for DDM office equipment (G-08) and the CbFRM package (C-02);
- (x) Community-based flood risk management support (C-02): to change proposal type from FTP to STP.
- Proposed additional works (instead of Salimabad channel closure). The PMO proposed to replace the Salimabad channel closure and ancillary works by possibly 25-30 km of additional riverbank protection works in the immediate vicinity of the subprojects sites to use large part of the current estimated 'savings'. The PMO (with ISPMC's support) will prepare a set of possible works and associated goods and works contracts (and/or extension of existing contracts) including environmental and economic analysis due diligence to maximize the utilization of the available funds and will inform ADB prior to the MTR mission. To allow implementation of these additional works during the short remaining project implementation period, the works will comprise underwater riverbank protection works with geobags and initial wave protection works (similar to works implemented under W-01 to W-05 and G-01 to G-03) that do not require any land acquisition. For this, the required procurement of goods (geobags) and works can follow the already approved bid documents for the previous works. These interventions will be planned to maximize the benefits at the current morphological setting. Likely areas of focus are (i) planned export processing zone near the Jamuna bridge, (ii) the confluence area of Jamuna and Ganges rivers, (iii) actively eroding riverbank on the left bank of the Jamuna that threaten the stability of distributary offtakes, and (iv) measures to stabilize the central char. All interventions will consider the current morphology, adapting to the river in line with the strategy outlined in the approved River Stabilization Plan.
- 21. The PMO will provide the revised procurement plan reflecting all the required changes to ADB by 15 May 2023, the Mission will then process the revised procurement plan for internal approval and when approved will then disclose it on the ADB's website. The weblink will be shared with PMO as soon as it is available. The Mission reminded PMO to comply with the arrangements (method, review, bidding procedure, and bidding document) specified in the approved procurement plan, and to seek ADB's prior concurrence to any further updates if needed.
- 22. **Data Security**. The Mission reminded the PMO staff to maintain strict confidentiality of information about procurement matters. Participation in bid evaluation committee and consultant

selection committee meetings should be strictly limited to the committee members only, and bid and evaluation documents should always be stored in locked cabinets with restricted access. Also, the PMO's Consultant Management System (CMS) password should be used by only one person. Each CMS account should be registered in the name of the real user. Computers storing project data should be password-protected, and assistants held accountable for data confidentiality.

B. Project management matters

- 23. **Project implementation arrangements.** The Project Steering Committee oversees project implementation, and guides and resolves implementation issues that require higher level interventions. A Dhaka-based PMO is established within BWDB to implement the project, apart from the CbFRM activities. There are three Subproject Management Offices (SMOs), one for each of the subprojects (Kaitola, Tangail and Manikganj). A PMU is established in DDM to implement the CbFRM-related activities.
- 24. **PMO/SMO Staffing.** The Mission reviewed with the PMO the status of staffing assignment and recruitment status of the staff positions and officers in the PMO and SMOs. Details are in Appendix 4. Overall, of the 68 positions by BWDB regular staff committed to be assigned to the project, only 27 have been filled so far. Of the 41 vacant posts, 14 are in PMO, 12 in SMO Kaitola, 7 in SMO Tangail, and 8 in SMO Manikganj. The 14 vacant posts in PMO are for 2 deputy project directors, 2 executive engineers, 2 subdivisional engineers, 1 revenue surveyor, 1 systems analyst, 1 programmer, 1 assistant programmer, 1 accounts officer, 2 senior accounts officer and 1 data entry operator. All the planned outsourced staff in the PMO and SMOs have not yet been recruited.
- 25. The Project Director (PD) of the PMO informed the Mission of the changes to the original BWDB staff deputation and staffing requirement to align with the approved DPP and to reflect the current status of the project. The PMO proposed revised staffing to be allocated to the project now only indicates 37 regular positions (Table 3). The Mission noted the significant reduction from the originally 68 positions committed when the loan and grant were signed. The following positions were reduced in the PMO: (i) two deputy project directors to one; (ii) four executive engineers to two; (iii) two subdivisional engineers to one; and (iv) three senior accounts assistants to one. For Kaitola and Tangail SMOs: (i) two subdivisional engineers to one; and (ii) three sub assistant engineers to two. The work assistants for Tangail and Manikgani SMOs were reduced from six to two, while for Kaitola SMO from six to three. In addition to the reduction of positions, the following positions were removed during the approval of the DPP: (i) 3 assistant engineers (1 in each of the 3 SMOs); (i) 2 revenue surveyors (1 in PMO and one in Manikganj SMO); (ii) 1 systems analyst in PMO; (iii) 1 programmer in PMO; (iv) 1 assistant programmer in PMO; (v) 1 accounts officer in PMO; and (vi) 1 data entry operator in PMO. Following the reduced staffing allowed per the DPP, only 10 positions are currently vacant (2 in PMO, 6 in Kaitola SMO and 2 in Manikgani SMO). The Mission expressed serious concerns regarding the reductions in staffing made in the DPP and furthermore that the remaining vacancies are still vacant. The Mission urged the PMO and BWDB to fill the vacant positions allowed per the DPP by 15 May 2023, and to find alternative solutions for the positions which were removed despite being needed under the project. Appendix 5 shows the revised staffing requirement. The PAM will be updated to reflect the revised PMO and SMOs staffing accordingly to the government's approved DPP.

- 26. Position of Chief Engineer (CE) River Management for main rivers of central Bangladesh. The Mission was informed that this position is still vacant and requested PMO/BWDB for this position to be filled as soon as possible (and before the start of the MTR mission) to (i) move forward/promote the BWDB-approved river stabilization plan (developed under Project 1) and (ii) coordinate with forthcoming projects from World Bank in the north and JICA (on a few tributaries), and the future follow-on ADB project (to be prepared by PMO with ISPMC's support before June 2024). The Mission reminded the PMO and DG BWDB that this issue is also very important for EKN and for achieving fully the road map of the MFF and that Project 2 includes activities to make operational the office of the CE River Management.
- 27. **Training.** The PD informed the Mission that awareness training for monitoring of environmental activities was conducted on 13 January 2023 for the contractors of SMO Tangail. The other two SMOs (Kaitola and Manikganj) will also receive similar training by 15 May 2023. The Mission informed the PMO that BRM is planning to conduct four disbursement 'clinics' this year at the division level. These trainings will discuss ADB's advance fund procedure, statement of expenditure expense review, and documents retention procedure for all ADB-administered loans and grants. The Mission will share relevant information of the proposed training in due course and requested PMO to coordinate with BRM for other financial management specific training. The Mission requested that at least a one-day training be organized in Dhaka for all the PMO, SMOs, and PMU-DDM accountants and other key staff and discuss the details of ADB requirements for maintenance of advance accounts, as well as financial audit requirements.
- 28. **Contract awards and disbursements.** For the last quarter of 2022 and as of 27 April 2023, the ADB rating for Project 2 is *at risk* due to low cumulative contract awards (CA) and disbursements (D). CA amount achieved is \$66.61 million against the projected amount of \$101.08 million for the same period (66%), which is only about 58% of the total loan and grant amount of \$174.89 million. D amount achieved to date is \$18.77 million against the projected \$77.65 million (24%), which equates to about 10% of the total loan and grant amount. Details are in the tables below.

- CA and D projections. The initial agreed projections (page 14 of the PAM) needed to 29. be updated considering that Project 2 became effective only in April 2022. The revised CA and D projections were agreed with PMO, reflected and locked in ADB system (eOps). The revised values need to be reflected in an updated version of the PAM. The Mission explained to PMO that ADB monitors quarterly the project performance based on CA and D as well as other criteria, namely safeguards, financial (such as APFS requirements), and technical. The Mission provided PMO with the detailed formula and criteria. The Mission emphasized that PMO needs to be vigilant in reaching these targets on a quarterly basis to keep the project rating "on track" in the ADB system. The Mission informed PMO that to keep the project rating "on track", cumulative CA and D should reach at least 90% of the CA and D targets, or at least that one of the two values reaches 90% of the target while the other value be at least 75% of the target in addition to the project fully complying with the other performance criteria. The project is also "at risk" for Q1 2023. The PMO and the Mission agreed to update the CA and D baseline projections in ADB system (eOps) after the MTR mission to reflect the most current status of the procurement of works, consultancy services, and goods at the time of the MTR mission.
- 30. Reasons for start-up delays and low CA and D achievements to date. The project experienced start-up delays at its onset as the government categorized the project as C (i.e., no

counterpart funds available) in mid-2022; hence during this period, PMO was not able to award any contracts. Subsequently, the project was recategorized as B (i.e., 75% of counterpart funds) later in 2022 by the government. The Mission received assurances from the PMO and MoWR that counterpart funds are fully available for this project for the current FY and next FY (ending in June 2024). Another reason of low CA and D to date is that bids of geobags and works received and now awarded were about 5% to 53% lower than the engineer's estimates (Table 10). Furthermore, since the cost estimates prepared in 2020/21, significant USD/BDT currency fluctuations have occurred (i.e., \$1 = 84.7 Taka in 2021 compared to about \$1 = 105 Taka now) resulting in a depreciation of about 24% of the value of the Taka compared to the USD (which very largely even offsets the increase of inflation over the period). The Mission fully recognized that the USD/BDT currency fluctuations and inflation are fully outside of the project control.

31. **Current 'savings' on the loan and grant.** Based on the above and further to the Salimabad channel closure not being technically feasible anymore (para. 13 – value of W-08 and W-17 and ancillary packages (W-12 to W-15 and W-18) is about \$30.41 million), the current 'savings' on loan are estimated at about \$70 million (including the amount of \$27 million for contingencies in the overall project financing plan which are currently unlikely to be needed). Also, there are currently about \$3 million of 'savings' on the grant that the Mission discussed with EKN for EKN to possibly consider cofinancing other packages (discussions are ongoing between the Mission and EKN).

- 32. The Mission requested the PMO to conduct a detailed review of possible savings bearing in mind the limited time left to implement the project and to investigate possible additional works that could be undertaken instead of the Salimabad channel closure works, such as riverbank protection works in the immediate vicinity of the subproject sites (para. 20) and to provide ADB with monthly updates on these matters. Partial cancellation, if any, will be further assessed during the midterm review mission.
- 33. **Contract Award (CA) and Disbursement (D) projections for 2023.** The Mission and the PMO reviewed the 2023 CA and D projections (Table 11). The PMO proposed to revise the quarterly projections as per Table 12.

- 34. **Government budget allocation**. Project 2 was initially categorized by the government as 'C' (i.e., 0% of GoB funds) in mid-2022, then it was re-categorized to 'B' (i.e., 75% of GoB funds). The Mission received assurances from the PD and MoWR that counterpart funds are fully available for this project for the current FY and next FY (ending in June 2024).
- 35. **Advance account**. The Mission discussed with DDM PMU the fund flow diagram and reminded DDM PMU to start setting-up its separate sub-advance account (in Bangladesh Taka) in a commercial bank for the ADB loan, which will be used exclusively for ADB's share of eligible expenditures. DDM PMU will be accountable and responsible for proper use of advances to its respective advance accounts. The Mission also advised DDM PMU to coordinate with ADB BRM for any questions related to establishing the sub-advance account. As indicated in para. 13 of the PAM, the PMO will be responsible for collecting and retaining all supporting documents and preparing and submitting withdrawal applications to ADB.
- 36. **Financial management action plan implementation.** The Mission with the PMO reviewed the status of the financial management time-bound action plan of the PAM (page 32). The details of the current status are in Appendix 6 whilst the key points are summarized below.
 - (i) **Staffing.** The PMO informed the Mission that the original staffing proposed by PMO in the PAM was not approved by the Ministry of Finance during the DPP approval. Currently, the PMO has one Deputy Director for accounts and one senior account assistant. Currently, both the senior account assistant for Tangail and Manikganj SMOs have been filled, while one account assistant has been assigned to Kaitola SMO upon approval of the higher authority of BWDB in March 2023. As per their

- ToR, ISPMC has filled an experienced financial management (FM) expert to support the PMO, SMOs and PMU of DDM.
- (ii) **Financial management capacity building**. The Mission informed PMO that disbursement clinics are being arranged by BRM and strongly encouraged PMO to coordinate with BRM to attend a project-specific financial management training.
- (iii) Internal audit. The PMO informed the Mission that the payment system in BWDB has their internal pre-checking procedure in different tiers before payment, so additional internal audit is deemed not essential by PMO. The Mission clarified that the pre-audit of expenses is not the function of internal audit. Internal audit assesses whether the controls are operating effectively. Therefore, the Mission recommended keeping the mitigating action as agreed with the PMO/BWDB during project processing and advised that the FM expert of the ISPMC provides capacity support to BDWD's internal audit.
- (iv) **Financial reporting.** The Mission reminded PMO to include the financial information (including variances) in the quarterly project reports (QPRs), the project financial statements in the annual report, and ensure to submit to ADB the required APFS prior to the deadline.
- (v) **Information systems.** The Mission reiterated the importance of automating all the accounts, including receipts and payments under the loan and grant, and financial reporting.
- 37. **Audited Project Financial Statement (APFS)**. APFS for fiscal year 2022 was agreed by ADB to be deferred since the project became effective only in April 2022 and no expenses were incurred up to the end of the fiscal year. The Mission reminded PMO that the next APFS which is due in December 2023 shall cover expenses incurred from project effectiveness (April 2022) up to the end of the fiscal year 2023.
- 38. **Progress towards achieving the DMF targets and outcome and current risks.** The current status of the DMF indicators for the outcome and outputs of the project are in Appendix 7. Progress towards the outcome indicators are currently on-track to be achieved, while some indicators for the three outputs are currently at risk of not being achieved fully:
 - (i) Output 1b. 7.9 km of climate-resilient flood embankment constructed, rehabilitated, or upgraded against 100-year probable floods.
 - Main current risks: land acquisition process has been initiated but its completion may be delayed. Not achieving this output indicator would significantly impact the indicators a and b of the outcome. 1.7 km of embankment does not depend on land acquisition and is currently not at risk of not being achieved.
 - (ii) Output 1c. 2 regulators and other hydraulic structures (i.e., fish passes) installed.

 Main current risk: 1 regulator is dependent on completing land acquisition process.
 - (iii) Output 1d. 1 channel closure with "building with nature" approach.
 - Main current risk: Salimabad channel closure is not technically feasible anymore (para. 12 and Appendix 2) due to large-scale morphological changes that resulted in the channel planned for closure now being the dominant channel along the left bank which does not allow a closure in the remaining project implementation period. Achieving this indicator is very unlikely.
 - (iv) Output 1g. 12 fish sanctuaries established.

- Main current risk: preparation can be undertaken under the loan and grant implementation period and may be achievable in 2025 with government counterpart funds. The study for identification and design of the fish sanctuaries (C-07) is not yet awarded and the outcomes of the study are expected only in late 2023. This does not allow to tender and implement the works within the remaining project implementation period.
- (v) Output 2d. Long-term river stabilization and river management master plans refined to include charlands development and submitted for endorsement by BWDB.
 - Main current risk: Detailed outline is achievable (para. 39) however a refined study is no longer achievable as it depends on outcomes from other studies under the project, such as the environmental baseline survey (C-15) and the socio-economic study of char people (C-16) which PMO has not yet awarded and for which the results can now only be expected end of 2023 at best.
- (vi) Output 2e. Gender responsive guideline for river management (focus Lower Jamuna) submitted for endorsement to BWDB.
 - Main current risk: Detailed outline is achievable (para. 39) but the preparation of a guideline depends on discussions between universities, government agencies, experts and other stakeholders and will take significant time that is no longer available.
- 39. The Mission reiterated to the PMO the need to expedite the implementation of necessary compensation to the affected persons (APs) as per the resettlement plan (RP) before commencement of the construction activities in October 2023, and advised PMO and ISPMC to think of alternatives on how activities (directly related to indicators) independent of the land acquisition process could be expedited (i.e., 1.7 km of embankment to be rehabilitated without need of land acquisition + 1 regulator). The PMO informed that activities related to indicator 1g can be prepared during the remaining project implementation period but can only be completed during the DPP validity period (ie: end of June 2025). While background information is to be collected, detailed outlines can be prepared for indicators 2d and 2e.
- 40. **Road map of the MFF and policy framework review.** The Mission reviewed with the PMO the policy framework adopted by the government which defines the actions, responsibilities, and targeted timeframe of implementation under the ADB's investment program. Overall, the road map and policy framework is on track, apart from the position of the CE River Management (para. 26). The detailed current status of the road map and policy framework is in Appendix 8.
- 41. **Loan covenants review.** The Mission reviewed the compliance with the loan and grant covenants (per Schedule 4 of the Loan Agreement and Article IV of the Grant Agreement) and the status as of 15 February 2023 is recorded in Appendix 9. For the loan, the Mission noted compliance with 25 covenants to be satisfactory, one has been complied with (clause 4), three are partially complied with (clauses 2, 3 and 31), and four are not yet due (clauses 10, 11, 25 and 27). For the grant, three are currently being complied with and one is not yet due. The Mission reminded PMO to closely monitor regularly the status of all covenants and ensure full compliance throughout the project implementation period.
- 42. **Reports and Disclosure Requirements.** The PMO is to submit to ADB the following reports: (i) quarterly progress reports (QPRs) in a format consistent with ADB's project

performance reporting system; (ii) consolidated annual reports including (a) progress achieved by output as measured through the indicator's performance targets of the DMF, (b) key implementation issues and solutions, (c) updated procurement plan, (d) updated implementation plan for the next 12 months; (iii) semi-annual safeguard monitoring reports, and (iv) a project completion report within 6 months of physical completion of the project.

- 43. Quarterly progress reports (QPR). The Mission reminded PMO of the requirement to report on overall progress of the project every quarter by submitting QPRs to ADB within 30 days from the end of each quarter. The Mission discussed the key contents of the QPR to ensure that it is prepared in an efficient and timely manner. The QPRs will contain relevant project progress, safeguards, and financial information (such as financial reports and disbursement reports including variance analysis of physical and financial progress, together with the status of the Financial Management time-bound Action Plan). The Mission reminded PMO to submit the QPRs timely and that QPRs are to be submitted to ADB until the loan closing date. Also, the Mission reminded the PMO that the outline of QPR is Attachment 3 of the PAM. PMO has not yet submitted to ADB the first QPR (July to Sep 2022), nor the second QPR (Oct to Dec 2022), but agreed to provide both overdue QPRs by 23 February 2023. Subsequently to the mission, PMO submitted the required documents on 23 February 2023.
- 44. **Consolidated annual reports.** The Mission also reminded PMO that annual reports should be submitted to ADB every year by 31 January and should include the following: (i) progress achieved by output as measured through the indicator's performance targets, (ii) key implementation issues and solutions, (iii) updated procurement plan, and (iv) updated implementation plan for the next 12 months. The first consolidated annual report is to be submitted by PMO to ADB in January 2024.
- 45. The reporting requirements of the PMO are summarized in Table 13.

46. **Project management information system (MIS) and asset management system (AMS)**. The Mission reminded the PMO and ISPMC to prioritize developing and expanding the knowledge based on river stabilization, including, but not limited to, data collection, management information system, asset management system, and O&M aspects, which are extremely important for the financial sustainability of the current and future investments. BWDB having operational and up-to-date MIS and AMS is important for BWDB to manage and maintain more efficiently accordingly to a risk-based approach BWDB's flood and erosion mitigation assets (not only at project level but BWDB-wide) – aspects also essential for ADB and EKN for the financial sustainability in the medium- and long-terms. The Mission emphasized that an adequate up-to-date operational asset management system is a cornerstone of flood and erosion risk management for financial sustainability and institutional memory for this type of

assets and investments. The ToR for package C-06 is being prepared by PMO and will be submitted to ADB by 15 May 2023 for review.

47. **Updating of Project Administration Manual.** The Mission will update the PAM during the MTR mission to document all the required changes (key person from EA, role of DDM PMU, staffing requirement, contract award and disbursement projections, reporting requirement, procurement plan, gender, etc.) and share the updated PAM with the PMO.

C. Environment and Social Safeguards

- 48. The project is categorized as A for Environment, A for Involuntary Resettlement, and C for Indigenous Peoples. The Mission reminded the PMO of the contractor's roles and responsibilities for implementing ADB's Safeguard Policy Statement, 2009 (SPS), as per the loan agreement.
- 49. Compliance with environmental safeguards covenant in the Loan Agreement. The Mission assessed Project 2 as compliant with the environmental safeguards covenant of the loan agreement. To date, the PMO and SMOs are ensuring compliance with the measures and requirements set forth in the environmental impact assessment (EIA) and rules of the government. Specifically, all prepared bidding documents and awarded contracts to date contain provisions requiring contractors to comply with the measures in the EIA and its environmental management plan (EMP). Per the EIA recommendations, bird and fish sanctuaries will be established at strategic locations to mitigate impacts to wildlife due to constructions and infrastructure development. To strengthen safeguard activities, PMO (with ISPMC's support) has undergone an awareness training for SMO of Tangail in line with supervision and monitoring of environmental activities of the contractors on 13 January 2023. There will be awareness trainings to SMOs of Sirajganj and Manikganj, where contractors will also be inducted on environmental safeguards.
- 50. **Semi-annual Environmental Monitoring Report (EMR).** As stipulated in the loan agreement, BWDB is required to prepare and submit semi-annual EMRs to ADB for review and disclosure. For Project 2, the first semi-annual EMR is to cover the months from April to December 2022 as reporting of environmental safeguards is to start when the loan became effective. The first semi-annual EMR of Project 2 was submitted by PMO to ADB on 2 February 2022 and subsequently reviewed by the Mission. PMO needed to update the report to cover the months of April until December 2022 and will revise the EMR and re-submit it to ADB by 27 February 2022. Subsequently, the PMO submitted the revised report covering the months of April until December 2022 on 27 February 2022, and it has been disclosed on the ADB's website. The project is a stipulated in the loan agreement, and the semi-annual EMRs to cover the months of April until December 2022 on 27 February 2022, and it has been disclosed on the ADB's website.
- 51. The Mission highlighted that PMO is only to disclose EMRs on the BWDB's website after ADB's approval of each semi-annual EMR. The succeeding semi-annual EMRs are expected to be submitted every 31st July (covering January to June) and 31st January (covering July to December). The PMO will continue to monitor beneficial environmental impacts and other environmental safeguards activities of Project 1, and include observations and findings as part of the EMR of Project 2.

- 52. As agreed for this project, BWDB is to recruit a qualified and experienced external monitoring expert to verify monitoring information of Project 2 due to potential significant environmental impacts of the works⁸ in line with the implementation of the EMP and compliance with relevant government rules and requirements. The Mission has previously reviewed the terms of reference for the external expert (i.e., C-18). When recruited, the expert will verify information of the draft semi-annual EMRs and will work on an intermittent basis particularly in the months of January and July, when semi-annual EMRs are being prepared by the PMO.
- 53. Addendum to EIA. The Mission noted that there could be reconfiguration of some works for W-08 and W-17 packages due to the Salimabad channel closure not being technically feasible anymore, and that some of the budget could be re-allocated to additional riverbank protection works. The location of the new protection works is not included in the EIA and is still to be fully determined by PMO. Per ADB Safeguard Policy Statement (SPS) 2009, impacts associated with changes in scope should be treated as unanticipated impacts. PMO, with support from ISPMC, is to prepare an addendum to the approved EIA to determine the potential impacts of the changes, evaluate the alternatives, and outline mitigation measures, and resources to address potential impacts.
- 54. The PMO with ISPMC's support will conduct environmental due diligence and assessment of the new site/s to prepare an addendum to the EIA. As part of the addendum, description of baseline environmental and social conditions will provide understanding of the current conditions of the new site/s and serve as benchmark. An EMP will be prepared by PMO to mitigate the impacts of the additional scope of works. At least 2 meaningful consultations are to be made by the PMO to affected people. To collect insights from affected people and create awareness about the new scope of works, the first consultation is to be carried out immediately after PMO would have identified the locations. The following consultation is to be undertaken when the draft EIA addendum is prepared to share the results of environmental assessment. The Mission will provide guidance to PMO (and ISPMC) for the preparation of addendum to the EIA. The first draft of the addendum was to be submitted to ADB by 30 April 2023 for review.
- 55. **Environmental Clearance Certificate (ECC)**. Bangladesh Environment Act (1995) and Environment Conservation Rule (1997) categorized as Red Category and a detailed EIA including an EMP was undertaken to fulfill the requirements of the government. The Red Category projects require an environmental clearance certificate (ECC) from the Department of Environment (DoE) every year. In view of the possible changes of scope in W-08 and W-17 packages, the Mission reminded the PMO to liaise with DoE to determine any further requirement for the proposed new scope of works, which is not part of the ECC application. The Mission requested the PMO to inform the Mission on the outcomes of the discussions with DoE by 30 April 2023.
- 56. **Social safeguards.** The project is category A for involuntary resettlement and category C for no impacts on Indigenous Communities. A Resettlement Framework (RF) for the investment program was prepared and adopted in 2014, and subsequently revised in 2018 under Project 1. The RF was then updated during the processing of Project 2 and disclosed in May 2021. One draft RP has been prepared for Shahjadpur flood embankment in May 2021 in

accordance with the legal and policy framework of the government and ADB's SPS (2009). The draft RP identified 34.1 hectares (ha) of land acquisition affecting 366 households (AHHs) with 1,944 affected persons, 1,333 structures and 7,048 trees. An update of the RP for Shahjadpur is required with sufficient time to carry out the land acquisition and implement the necessary compensation to APs accordingly to the RP before commencement of construction activities in October 2023. The Mission agreed that if the contract award for engaging an RP-INGO requires much more time, the update of the RP for Shahjadpur embankment could instead be carried out by ISPMC using the part of the provisional sum under their contract to expedite the RP implementation process.

- 57. The Mission reminded the PMO to expedite the recruitment process of the INGO and external monitor process to ensure timely RP implementation. All required committees are to be formed during the RP update in March 2023. Also, the Mission agreed that contract award is to be initiated for the entire 7.9 km long embankment within a single contract (1.7 km of the embankment are to be rehabilitated and do not need land acquisition) with notice to proceed to be issued to the contractor(s) section wise without limiting safeguards requirements.
- 58. **Grievance Redress Committee (GRC).** GRCs have not yet been established at local level. An information campaign is yet to be carried out among the APs to disseminate details about the PMO-level GRC. The Mission reminded PMO to undertake this as a priority.
- 59. **Social safeguard reporting.** The project will continue semiannual social safeguards reporting until a facility completion report is produced and approved by ADB. The ISPMC safeguards consultant will support PMO to prepare the social safeguards monitoring reports until an INGO is recruited for RP implementation. Once the INGO is on board, all data required for the report is expected to be generated from the INGO.

60. Social Safeguards Agreed Actions

- (i) Updating of RP to be initiated by PMO with ISPMC's support in March 2023.
- (ii) All required committees including the grievance committee and property valuation committee are to be formed in line with RP requirements in March 2023.
- (iii) Till recruitment of resettlement NGO, PMO with ISPMC's support is to continue submission of semiannual monitoring reports to ADB.
- (iv) RP implementing NGO and external monitoring consultant are to be recruited by PMO by April 2023.
- (v) Contract award for 7.9 km embankment can be initiated without limiting safeguards compliance as guided in RP with provision of sectional notice to proceed to contractor for sites that are ready to works to be implemented.
- 61. **Gender**. The project is categorized as effective gender mainstreaming (EGM) and has a Gender Action Plan (GAP) which reflects all project outputs maximizing women's benefit from the project interventions. The Mission appreciated that the PD has assigned the Executive Engineer of the PMO as the gender focal point who leads the GAP activities and provides all assistance to the project's gender specialists (consultants) on these matters. The Mission also appreciated the submission of the GAP quarterly progress report from October to December 2022 and noted that five bidding documents for civil works have integrated clauses on core labor standards, including equal pay for work of equal value, occupational health and safety, water supply, sanitation, segregated shelter, and facilities The PMO informed that another gender specialist at PMO level is to be recruited by mid-March 2023 to expedite the process of the GAP implementation.

- 62. Regarding the GAP-QPR, the Mission suggested updating the QPR by including the last GAP progress report of the Project 1 since the GAP represents the overall program, including Projects 1 and 2. The Mission requested the PMO to include the updated GAP implementation progress with the overall QPR of the project. Given the project's implementation period up to end of June 2024, the Mission strongly suggested that PMO expedites the recruitment process of livelihood NGO and disaster management NGO for successful implementation of the GAP. Until the NGOs are on board, the Mission suggested that the ISPMC gender specialist continues with other activities, such as updating the existing BWDB's gender-specific module by including awareness on gender-based violence and community-based redress mechanism and gender sensitization training for the BWDB staff (GAP activity 7), and establishment of MIS, quality control systems, accountability measures and gender-sensitive project monitoring tools (GAP activity 10).
- 63. **Risks linked to forthcoming elections**. The PMO informed the Mission of the forthcoming general election towards end of 2023 which may have some impacts on the project implementation. Experience from previous elections indicates that security measures may be in place. These would hinder in particular road traffic and therefore cause delays to both the supply of construction material to site and the traveling of workers and site supervisors to site. It can therefore be expected that the implementation of works (and its related supply of goods packages) could significantly be hindered. However, as the election is expected to be at the start of the construction season, considerable time (from about February to June 2024) is likely to be available for construction without impacts from the election. The Mission requested the PMO to expedite all procurement before the election.
- 64. **DPP revision.** The implementation of changes to the project requires revision of the key GoB document for the project, the Detailed Project Proforma. In accordance with current government rules, the revision of the DPP is possible at ministry level as long as the nature of the works, the project area, and the overall project cost do not change significantly. This is the case for the planned revisions discussed during this mission. It is suggested that the PMO starts the process of revising the DPP immediately to allow the finalized revised document to be sent for approval at time of the MTR mission. After that, it is expected by the PMO to be finalized within one month. To avoid further delays in relation to contract award, it is further suggested that the PMO starts the bidding process for the additional works and goods packages in parallel with the DPP revision, following the approval of the updated procurement plan by ADB.

IV. CONCLUSIONS AND PRIORITY ACTIONS

65. The following actions were agreed during the mission (Table 14).

V. MISSION'S WRAP-UP MEETINGS

66. On 22 February 2023, a pre-wrap up meeting with MoWR took place and on 10 May 2023, a wrap up meeting was held with ERD. The Mission's findings were discussed at both meetings. The comments and agreements recorded by the Mission are summarized in the following two paragraphs.

67. **Pre-wrap up meeting with MoWR:**

- (i) **Government budget allocation**: counterpart funds are fully available for the current fiscal year and the next one (ending in June 2024) (*para. 34*).
- (ii) **Salimabad channel closure** not being technically feasible anymore is recognized without the need for PMO to assess this any further (*para. 12 and Appendix 2*); instead PMO is to focus on progressing the remaining works in hand and assessing the proposed additional works (*para. 20*) to maximize the utilization of the funds before the closure of the MFF in June 2024.
- (iii) **Current savings on the loan and grant amounts**: Prior to the start of the mid-term review mission, PMO will conduct a detailed review of the savings and investigate possible alternatives (including environmental aspects) that could be undertaken in lieu of Salimabad channel closure works (*para. 32*) and will inform ADB prior to the start of the mid-term review mission.
- (iv) **Partial cancellation of the loan**: this will be assessed in detail jointly by PMO and ADB during the mid-term review mission (*para. 32*).
- (v) **Land acquisition:** PMO was requested to expedite implementation of necessary compensation to the affected persons before commencement of any above water construction activities (*para. 39*).
- (vi) **Staffing**: PMO and BWDB need to urgently fill all the pending vacant positions allowed per the approved DPP and to find alternative solutions for the positions which were removed despite being needed under the project (*para. 25*). In particular, the position of Chief Engineer River Management for main rivers of central Bangladesh was agreed to be filled by PMO/BWDB as soon as possible, <u>and before the start of the midterm review mission</u>. (*para. 26*).
- (vii) **DPP revision**: the current DPP is valid till June 2025, however PMO was requested to start revising the DPP immediately by incorporating the possible proposed additional works (*para*. 20) and for the final revised DPP to be submitted by PMO/BWDB/MoWR to the government immediately after the end of the mid-term review mission (*para*. 64).

68. Wrap up meeting with ERD:

- (i) **Mid-term review (MTR) mission**: the Mission informed that the MTR mission is planned from 21 to 28 May pending to ADB receiving clearance from ERD.
- (ii) **Salimabad channel closure** not being technically feasible anymore was discussed and acknowledged (para. 12 and Appendix 2) and PMO is to focus on progressing the

- remaining works in hand and assessing the proposed additional works (para. 20) to maximize the utilization of the funds before the closure of the MFF in June 2024.
- (iii) Possible extension of closing date of MFF and Project 2: the Mission explained that as per previous discussions held in previous years and in particular during processing of Project 2 in 2020 and 2021, it will be very difficult to obtain approval from the ADB Board for a one year extension of the closing date of the MFF and Project 2 and that activities that can not be completed under Project 2 before 26 June 2024 will have to be completed by BWDB with the government own funds or included in the follow-on project to be prepared by the government before 26 June 2024. However, ERD suggested that the PMO sends to ERD a letter with all justifications that in their view may warrant an possible extension of the closing date of the MFF and Project 2 for ERD to review and possibly send to ADB for consideration.
- (iv) **Staffing**: MoWR briefly informed of progress regarding the appointment of the Chief Engineer River Management for main rivers of central Bangladesh.





- 2.90 km at upstream of W-04 package. The technical committee formed by BWDB having members from BWDB design, planning, field, IWM and CEGIS recommended for this RTW work in February 2022. Beside this, another 5.1 km is also vulnerable in between aforementioned 2.90 km and W-4 package. So, total 8 km new work needed (can be finalized by project technical committee). Immediately, precautionary emergency work of 3 km will be taken under emergency package (W-09) in this area.
- BWDB conducted a complete study for Investigation of Morphological Process at Downstream of Bangabandhu (Jamuna) Bridge & Erosion Control along Left Bank of Jamuna River at Manikganj District through contarcting Institute of Water Modelling (IWM). The study was conducted during March 2022 to January 2023. The study recommended for 3 interventions at left bank of Jamuna and Padma river
 - · 2 km of revetment at Char near Bachamara (near Salimabad)
 - · 10 km of revetment at d/s of Paturia to Gopinathpur (near Harirumpur),
 - 1.5 km of revetment at Near Jafarganj
